EXCURSION TO MONTE SCHERBELINO

A big city produces lots of waste. The excursion on Saturday afternoon will bring us to Monte Scherbelino. This former waste deposit in Frankfurt's Stadtwald ("City Forest") is slowly being turned into a nature reserve — a hopeful example of how humankind's negative effects on its environment can be undone. Formerly a no-go area due to toxic gases being emitted from the 45 m high waste mound, the Monte Scherbelino project was initiated within the federal state's project



Städte Wagen Wildnis ("Cities Dare Wilderness"). After a long period of rehabilitation activities, landscape alterations took place in order to create a spatially heterogeneous area at the foot of the waste hill. After that, natural succession took its course, with exciting developments. What used to be a biologically dead pond is today a hunting area for kingfishers. Although plant pioneers included massive swards of invasive exotics such as *Epilobium brachycarpum*, rare and protected plant species such as *Isolepis setacea* and *Centaurium pulchellum* also managed to establish in the area. The area is normally closed to the public; only through guided tours can the nature reserve be visited. We encourage you to stay a while longer and take the chance to see and hear about a unique nature restoration project. We leave by bus on Saturday at 13 o'clock and we guarantee that we will be back at Riedberg Campus latest at 18 o'clock. A lunch bag will be provided.
